Celebrate MAPP's 50th Anniversary with Irina Bokova. Born in Sofia (Bulgaria), Ms. Bokova served two terms as Director-General of UNESCO (2009-2017). She is the first woman and the first Eastern European to lead the organization. Today, cultural heritage is at the frontline of "modern" conflicts, under attack by extremists around the world who aim to erase histories and identities. Protection of cultural heritage is vital for reconciliation, social transformation and efforts to safeguard peace; it becomes an important part of security and humanitarian responses in crisis situations. Ms. Bokova will discuss why protecting world heritage is one of the most positive, visionary and transformative ideas that has emerged in the last century. This is the idea that heritage belonging to different cultures may represent "outstanding universal value" and should be protected by international law embodied in the World Heritage Convention; the idea that humanity stands united in its diversity around shared values; the idea that all cultures are different but that difference does not divide—it unites.

Frederick Douglass Bicentennial Lecture

Monday, February 5

In celebration of the 200th anniversary of the birth of Frederick Douglass, distinguished professor of American history, David W. Blight will deliver a public talk entitled, "My Voice, My Pen, My Vote: Frederick Douglass - Legacies in Our Own Time."

Born into slavery on Maryland's Eastern Shore, Douglass became a leading crusader to abolish slavery and a tireless advocate for human rights and equality.

David Blight is a distinguished Professor of American History at Yale University and Director of the Gilder Lehrman Center for the Study of Slavery, Resistance, and Abolition. He is the author of numerous award-winning books including *Race and Reunion: The Civil War in American Memory* (2001) and a new biography of Frederick Douglass to be published later this year.

This event is part of the Douglass 200, a year-long initiative by the University of Maryland to commemorate the bicentennial of Frederick Douglass.

"AGENTS OF CHANGE" (USA, 2017)

Monday, February 5

During the late 1960s, as Civil Rights and anti-Vietnam War demonstrations made national headlines, movements erupted for racial equity and

meaningful education on college campuses throughout the United States. From the well-publicized events at San Francisco State in 1968 to the image of black students with guns emerging from the takeover of the student union at Cornell University in April, 1969, the struggle for a more relevant and meaningful education, including demands for black and ethnic studies programs, became a clarion call across the country in the late 1960's. Through the stories of these young men and women who were at the forefront of these efforts, *"Agents of Change"* examines the untold story of the racial conditions on college campuses and in the country that led to these protests. The film's characters were caught at the crossroads of the civil rights, black power, and anti-Vietnam war movements at a pivotal time in America's history.

Today, over 45 years later, many of the same demands are surfacing in campus protests across the country, revealing how much work remains to be done. *"Agents of Change"* links the past to the present and the present to the past--making it not just a movie but a movement.

Spotlight: Senior Chloe Chavenau

Chloe Chavenau is a senior at the University of Maryland, originally from Paris, France. She moved to Maryland three years ago to attend UMD and is majoring in Sociology and Women's Studies. Last semester, she was the TA for Dr. Catherine Schuler's WMST300: Feminist Reconceptualizations of Knowledge. During her time at the university, she has been involved in multiple organizations, including UMD's Crisis Hotline "Help Center," as well as Active Minds, and Terps for Recovery.

In her classes and research, Chloe's focus has been women's psychology and the treatment of PTSD in abused women and children. Indeed, after having taken PSYC318 and PSYC319, which gave her the opportunity to volunteer in a domestic violence shelter working with women and children, she has developed a strong interest in the field and plans on applying to graduate programs in Social Work to become a licensed therapist and counselor. Later, she would like to earn a Ph.D. in Counseling Psychology. Her dream is to develop a better and more accessible method of treatment for victims of violence who suffer from PTSD, as well as develop more prevention methods.

- To contribute to and facilitate the continued growth of student disability organizations on campus

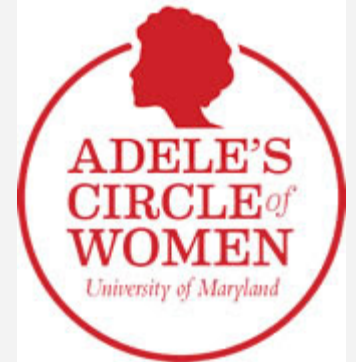

Adele's Circle of Women Scholarship Opportunities

Deadline: February 3

Adele's Circle of Women Scholarship grants annual scholarships to help deserving students who advance the role of women and girls in their academic studies and activities, who plan to further this leadership in their personal and professional lives. The scholarship seeks to aid emerging student leaders and/or recognize accomplished student leaders. The five scholarships provide a \$500 award to a current University of Maryland undergraduate or graduate student. Established in 2015, the Adele's Circle of Women Scholarship is generously funded by Terp alumnae.



Eligibility Requirements for five (5) \$500 scholarships:

- Current UMD student (undergraduate or graduate)
 - Emerging Student Leaders:
 - One (1) First Year Student
 - One (1) Second Year Student
 - Accomplished Student Leaders:
 - One (1) Third Year Student
 - One (1) Fourth Year Student
 - One (1) Graduate Student
- In good academic standing with the University
- Demonstrates good citizenship and a positive attitude
- Previous recipients of Adele's Circle of Women Scholarship are not eligible to apply.

Applications are due no later than February 3, 2018 to be considered for a 2017-2018 award. Awards will be given at Adele's Circle of Women spring event - HerStory. All applicants are strongly encouraged to attend the event to be held April 13, 2018 in the Stamp Student Union.

Maryland Summer Scholars 2018

Deadline: February 14

The Maryland Summer Scholars Program (MSS) provides opportunities for University of Maryland, College Park (UMD) undergraduates to spend much of the summer working closely with faculty mentors on ambitious research, scholarly, or artistic projects. The MSS program provides awards of \$3,000 to approximately 25-30 outstanding undergraduates each summer.

Many Summer Scholars expand their summer research into an independent study or honors thesis project the following autumn semester, and find that their research experience helps distinguish their applications for graduate study, fellowships, internships, employment and other competitive opportunities.

Maryland Summer Scholars (MSS) may conduct their summer research on the College Park campus or elsewhere in the U.S. or abroad as required by the nature of the project. Students whose projects require travel for an extended period of time to off campus locations (not to include regular commuting) may submit a travel supplement request as directed in the online application form.

Eligibility:

To be eligible to apply for an MSS award students must:

- Have earned 12 or more UMD course credits (not including AP or IB credits) by the date of the application deadline;
- Have a cumulative UMD GPA of 3.40 or higher by the date of the application deadline; and
- Expect to receive their undergraduate degree no earlier than December 2018.
- Deadline.
- The deadline for applying for summer 2018 Maryland Summer Scholars awards is 11:59 pm, Wednesday, February 14th, 2018.

Application requirements:

- A completed and submitted online application form (see "apply now" link in box to the right).
- A student-written summer research proposal (see "advice for project proposal" link in the box to the right) uploaded to the application.
- A letter of recommendation from a UMD faculty member addressing the merit of the proposed summer research and the student's qualification to undertake that project, and a brief description of their plans for providing suitable mentoring/advising for the project. Please note: If an appropriate UMD expert does not have a faculty appointment, but has a position of comparable expertise/responsibility at the University, that is acceptable. Please see the FAQ page if you are certain that an appropriate expert cannot be found at the University of Maryland.
- A second letter of recommendation which may be from a secondary mentor/advisor for the summer research project or a general academic reference addressing the student's academic abilities and potential. Both recommendation letters should be emailed to ugresearch@umd.edu.
- An unofficial University of Maryland transcript including any coursework/grades from the fall semester preceding the date of the application deadline. The transcript should be uploaded to the application.

Final Reporting Requirements:

Summer Scholars will be required to:

- Complete a concise research report, or submit a specified alternative final product of their research;
- Present a poster describing their work at Undergraduate Research Day in the Spring following their Summer award. Undergraduate Research Day usually takes place on the last Wednesday in April in the Stamp Student Union. Students who will have graduated in December are exempt from presenting at Undergraduate Research Day.

Learn about the GILMAN INTERNATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP, which provides up to \$5,000 for study abroad students with financial need who receive Pell Grants. In the last 2 1/2 years, 70 University of Maryland students won Gilman Scholarships-a 45% acceptance rate!

MOSAIC Diversity & Leadership Retreat

MOSAIC is a two-day, one-night weekend retreat focused on exploring the relationship between diversity and leadership. Interactive sessions and group discussions are designed to create an environment for individuals to examine their identity and how it influences their understanding of and approach to leadership. JD/MA Dual Degree in Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies, University of Albany

Application Deadline: June 1

The JD/MA dual degree is an exciting new program articulated between the University of Albany Department of Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies and Albany Law School. This program allows graduate students to combine their interests in feminist, critical race, and social justice issues with legal studies, leading to professional employment in law, advocacy, nonprofits, non-governmental organizations, and community organizing, to name a few.

Students in the JD/MA dual degree program will fulfill requirements for both degrees, which may be completed in four years or less. They will spend their first year at Albany Law School and their second year in the M.A. program. The arrangement of the remaining two years is flexible. Students wishing to enroll in a dual degree program must meet the admissions requirements of each school, including the completion of the LSAT for Albany Law.

Students in dual-degree programs must earn 87 credits to receive the JD degree. A maximum of 12 credits earned in the M.A. program may count toward the 87 required credits. This maximum means that students must earn 75 credits at Albany Law School to obtain both degrees.

The M.A. in WGSS requires a total of 32 credits, including several core courses, a Master's Final Project, and elective courses forming a cohesive cluster. A maximum of 9 credits earned in the J.D. program may count toward the 32 required credits (and may possibly form the cohesive cluster requirement).
